The season of Lent is quickly coming to a close. Our worship time together has been focused on, "Lookin' for Love in All the Wrong Places." Just as we search for the perfect words when playing Scrabble, it is important to search for the ways in which Jesus has shown his love to us.

The word "Lent" comes from an old English word for springtime. I know spring started this week as, interestingly enough, there were three crocuses that blossomed on Monday, March 20. Lent is a momentary pause to rethink the ways in which we search for love. Whether in the right places or wrong places, love is available for us all. Our gathering as a community of faith enables us to be God's love to each other and to those we meet outside the four walls of the church building.

The most striking worship celebrations of the Christian church happen every year at the end of the Lenten season. There is no greater contrast between darkness and light than the eclipse and glory that were experienced by Jesus' disciples between Palm Sunday and Easter morning. For centuries, Christians have marked the progression of these events through worship. We, the church, are invited to be a part of the events that honor Christ, celebrate salvation, and grow in the way of Jesus through being together as a community of faith and personal reflection.

Holy Week begins on Sunday, April 2, with the celebration of Jesus' entry into Jerusalem with the shouting of "Hosanna" and the waving of palms. Maundy Thursday, April 6, is a gathering of the community to hear the journey of Jesus with his disciples that included gathering at the communion table. Easter morning, April 9, the sunrise brings a new day of joyful celebration in the resurrection of Jesus. Worshipping together on Easter culminates a week of mixed emotions – elation and joy, anticipation, terror, bewilderment, hopefulness, love, and empowerment. It is my hope that you will choose to be a part of all these opportunities to be in fellowship with fellow travelers on the journey with Jesus in Jerusalem.

It is easy to celebrate the conclusion of Lent with the joy of Easter. The church season continues with worship each Sunday. A time to build relationships with others of faith, listen for God's call for you, and find encouragement to live as a disciple of Christ in this crazy world.

Gathering together is an occasion for a first step on the a path to a healthy relationship with God - a crossroads. The season of Lent may be coming to a close but let us take what we have learned and apply it to our everyday, ordinary lives. The opportunity to become the people God has called us to be. It is my prayer that I'll see you at the crossroads of your journey.

Crown Him with Many Crowns By Muriel Magg, Music Team Chairperson

Growing up in a traditional church has given me the experience of being around hymns that have enriched the church for years. "Crown Him with Many Crowns" is one of my favorites I can still remember singing during Easter when I was a little girl. While this majestic hymn can certainly be sung at any time, we often sing it on Easter Sunday to celebrate the victorious savior Jesus Christ.

The overall theme of the great worship hymn "Crown Him with Many Crowns" is based on the nature of Jesus: Revelation 19:12. There John says, "On His head were many crowns." He is the Lamb upon the throne who willingly gave His life up on Calvary's cross as the one true sacrifice for our sin.

"Crown Him with Many Crowns" had two writers of different theological backgrounds, both distinguished Church of England clergymen. The texts come from Matthew Bridges a British-Canadian hymnodist who lived from 1800-1894, and Godfrey Thring (1823-1903), an Anglican clergyman, poet and hymnodist. Matthew Bridges who was raised in a Church of England environment later converted to Roman Catholicism, a faith he adhered to for the remainder of his life. Both men are usually credited as the writers. There are 12 stanzas in all, with Bridges writing the first six and Thring writing the second six. There is no record of Bridges and Thring meeting in person to work on the hymn. Therefore, the hymn has evolved as a composite of the original text by Bridges written in 1851, and Thring's version written twenty-three years later. The different verses are mixed and matched with three of the six more popular verses being written by Bridges, and three written by Thring. The result is a stirring hymn of worship containing five verses in most hymnals. It is a hymn full of reminders of Jesus and His reign over the world, his death, burial and resurrection, and the praise we will give Him in heaven.

Stanza one mentions "the heavenly anthem drowns all music but it's own" because the praise of Jesus in heaven is stronger in meaning than any music on earth. The following stanzas sing about the Lord of Life, Peace, Love, and the Lord of Years that will last throughout eternity, which is how the hymn ends.

The tune DIADEMATA was composed by English organist and composer George Elvy (1816-1893), for Bridge's text and is titled for the Greek word meaning "crowns."

Christ was not simply a prophet, He was not simply the carpenter's son, and He was not simply human, or simply divine. The call to "crown him with many crowns" is a simple but profound declaration that Christ is many things and everything. HE IS LORD OF ALL, to be crowned for many things that all add up to Him being SAVIOR OF THE WORLD.

Crown Him with Many Crowns puts a spirit of adoration into us. It causes us to look to Jesus and glorify Him. May we always praise Jesus, not only on Easter but every day of the year.






