

# Pastor's Reflections

The season of Lent has begun, 40 days from Ash Wednesday (which was February 22) to the Thursday of Holy Week, not including Sundays. A time of the year that embraces the meaning of the word 'Lent', which is lengthening. The days are getting longer each day allowing for more light to enter our winter world.

Lent, in the Christian church, is noted to be a time of repentance, reflection, and meditation. That is not a feeling of shame but an awareness that there are things that separates us from God. I consider it a time to take a deep look at my own journey of faith. An opportunity to contemplate what Jesus really did for me on the cross. Lent is an excellent time to give up on one's own resolutions and listen for God's leading. It is always possible that where God leads might be more difficult but with the realization that only the grace of God is sufficient to serve him.





As your worship leader through this season of Lent, the focus will be "Lookin' for Love In All the Wrong Places". The scriptures each week are filled with images of where love, grace, forgiveness, righteousness, and healing can really be found. It is not in the "usual places". I find that we look for wholeness and happiness in places where we find only temporary "good feelings" and satisfaction. It is my prayer that we, as the community of faith, will take this time for reflection as well as a time to reassess where we are searching for meaning and purpose. The stories of Jesus are offered as a way to find out the real deal.

Each week during March and April leading to Easter on April 9<sup>th</sup> the focus will be "Lookin' for".... for the Resister, for the Helper, for the Thirst-Quencher, for the Shepherd, the Liberator, and the Unexpected.

The Christian traditions of Lent include prayer, fasting, and giving. Many choose to enter this season by the giving up of

something as a practice of self-sacrifice, denial. and repentance. Lent is an opportunity to grow closer to God, to remember Jesus' life and death, and to focus more on him and less on ourselves and our own busy-ness. Fasting or abstaining from certain activities and items in our lives can help us focus on the life and love of Jesus. Have you ever thought of giving up or giving as a daily practice during Lent? Some suggestions - Giving up: social media, sugar, online shopping, clutter, complaining, TV, soda, etc. Giving to: a daily contribution either monetary or material good to a food pantry, donating a piece of no longer worn clothing to a thrift store, or placing a quarter a day in a blessing jar to be donated at the end of the season.

Whatever or however you choose to move through this season, may it be one of meaning, reflection, direction, and experiencing the presence of God.

# LORD, WHO THROUGHOUT THESE FORTY DAYS A LENTEN HYMN

One of the most meaningful hymns of Lent is "Lord, Who Throughout These Forty Days" written by Claudia Frances Hernaman and signals the beginning of Lent. Claudia Hernaman (1838-1898) was born in Surrey, England, and died in Brussels, Belgium. She was the daughter of an Anglican minister, and she married a minister. Like so many other women hymn writers of the nineteenth century, she devoted her life to teaching children about the Christian faith. Not much else seems to be known of Claudia's life except the more than 150 hymns she wrote or translated from Latin, were mostly for children.

Our congregation often sings this simple, yet earnest hymn found on page #211 in The New Century Hymnal almost every Lenten season. "Lord, Who Throughout These Forty Days" was not included in hymnals until the mid-twentieth century, when it first appeared in the Irish Church Hymnal (1960) and Hymns for Church and School (1964). By the 1970s, it was a standard hymn in most hymnals in the United States. It is based on the account of the temptation of Jesus found in the three Gospels -- Matthew 4:1-11; Mark 1:12-13; Luke 4:1-13. As is the case with many hymns, Christ's life becomes a model for how his followers should confront temptation.

The verses of "Lord, Who Throughout These Forty Days" track closely with our own Lenten journey. Forty is a number which recurs throughout the Bible with special significance.

- Noah's flood: It rained for 40 days, and Noah waited another 40 days before opening the window of the Ark.
- The Israelites wandered in the desert for 40 years;
- Moses, Elijah, and Jesus fasted in the desert for 40 days each; and
- Jesus was seen on earth, 40 days after the resurrection.

Today, Hernaman's text is considered an "adult" hymn. The lyrics composed by Claudia Hernaman are set to the tune of ST. FLAVIAN which first appeared some 300 years earlier than this text, published in 1562 to which it is most commonly played and sung. The harmonies you hear today were written by English church organist and composer Richard Redhead in 1856. The hymn is so full of scriptural truth that one barely needs to read the Gospel to understand the full story. This brings to light the value of sound, doctrinal hymns that were the mainstay of many persecuted Christians of the Reformation and pre-Reformation era who had no access to the Bible. They could remember the Bible truths through the words of great hymns and psalms. Isn't it amazing that a text and tune written so many years apart could eventually be placed together in such a beautiful way? Also consider how a new generation is interpreting this historic hymn with the American folk tune LAND OF REST.

The first two lines of each stanza tell us of Jesus' temptations, and the last two lines encourage us to

model our behavior on Christ's example. The themes of Lent are in each stanza: fasting and prayer; struggle with Satan and sin; meditation on scripture and penance; and looking toward the joy of Easter.

Just as we prepared for Christ's birth during Advent, let us prepare for his death and resurrection during the season of Lent.

It was for us that Jesus came; for us that he fasted in the Wilderness; for us that He prayed; for us that He bore the humiliation and passion of the cross; and it was for us that He rose again from the grave that wonderful Spring morning in the Garden.



# ONE GREAT HOUR OF SHARING = THOUSANDS OF LIVES CHANGED

What is One Great Hour of Sharing®? One Great Hour of Sharing, part of Our Church's Wider Mission, is the special mission offering of the United Church of Christ that carries God's message of love and hope to people in crisis. The UCC works with international partners to provide sources of clean water, food, education and health care, small business micro-credit, advocacy and resettlement for refugees and displaced persons, and emergency relief and rehabilitation. One Great Hour of Sharing also supports domestic and international ministries for disaster preparedness and response.

Who participates in One Great Hour of Sharing? everal Christian denominations – American Baptist Church, Christian Church (Disciples of Christ), Church of the Brethren, the United Church of Christ, and Church World Service – work together to develop common promotional materials thereby sharing ideas, costs, and a commitment to faithful service. Each denomination receives and manages its respective One Great Hour of Sharing offering.

**How is the United Church of Christ's offering used?** Over fifty-five percent (55%) of the UCC's offering supports international development initiatives. The offering also funds refugee resettlement, disaster preparedness and response, and disaster-related volunteer initiatives in the U.S. and internationally.

Where and how are OGHS funds shared? The United Church of Christ responds to humanitarian and development needs in the world. Specifically, the UCC supports sustainable development and refugee needs internationally and provides disaster relief and immigration assistance in the United States. The United Church of Christ responds as a member of organizations such as Church World Service and the ACT Alliance. We also support the direct mission efforts of churches and church-based organizations that the United Church of Christ and the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) have direct partnerships with through Global Ministries. Nearly one-fifth of the UCC's OGHS offering is shared through Church World Service to support refugee, and disaster programs worldwide.

What percentage of OGHS donations are used directly for mission? On average, of every dollar given to One Great Hour of Sharing, 95 cents is used directly for mission programming; and 5 cents for interpretation materials. The associated administrative costs are paid by gifts to Our Church's Wider Mission National Basic Support.

How are decisions made to fund the various projects? Most of the expenditures are put into the budget to support long-term sustainable development. All funding is reviewed and monitored by a leadership committee that also reviews grant requests for long-term disaster rehabilitation initiatives and refugee support.


