

The Pastor's Piece **Run For Your Life** By Pastor Walt Hampton, J.D., CFC

She ran!

Early on that first Easter morning, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene went to the tomb and found it empty. The stone had been rolled away, and the body of Jesus was nowhere to be found. In a state of shock and confusion, she did not freeze or retreat into despair; instead, she ran. Mary ran to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one Jesus loved, and exclaimed, "They have taken the Lord out **Inside this Issue:**

of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid him!"

Consider the weight of this moment. Mary Magdalene, a woman who had been transformed by her encounter with Christ, finds herself at the epicenter of a divine mystery. Her response? She runs to share what she has found. This act of running is not merely physical—it's a spiritual sprint towards the fulfillment of a mission. It is the same urgency and purpose that earned Mary the title "Apostle to the Apostles." She was the first to bear witness to the Resurrection, tasked with spreading the news that would alter the course of history.

This story, while ancient, speaks volumes to us today. As Easter people, we are inheritors of Mary's mission. We are called to run out and spread the Good News that Christ is risen and that eternal life awaits for all of us. This call to action is not a leisurely stroll but a passionate sprint fueled by the transformative power of the Gospel.

What does it mean for us, in our time, to run as Mary did? It means that we are to live out our faith with urgency and conviction. It is a call to move beyond the walls of our church and into the world, carrying the message of hope, love, and redemption. It is an invitation to engage with our communities, to listen deeply, and to offer the healing presence of Christ in places marred by division, suffering, and despair.

Running in the way of Mary Magdalene means recognizing the sacred worth of every single person we encounter, regardless of economic means, race, religion, creed, sexual orientation or gender identification. It means recognizing that every single person, without exception, is made in the image and likeness of an all loving God: male and female; black and brown and white; gay and straight; transgender; binary and non-binary. It means advocating for justice, showing mercy, and walking humbly with our God. It calls us to be witnesses to the Resurrection in our words and actions, embodying the love of Christ in all that we do.

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This Easter season, let us embrace our identity as Easter people. Let us remember that the tomb is empty not just one day a year, but every day. The stone has been rolled away, inviting us to step out into the world with the assurance of Christ's victory over death. Let us run with the perseverance that the race requires of us, fueled by the knowledge that in Christ, love triumphs over hate, light overcomes darkness, and eternal life is freely offered to all.

As we move into this Easter Season, into the spring in our beautiful Valley, may we carry with us the courage of Mary Magdalene. May we be quick to love, eager to serve, and relentless in spreading the joy

of the Resurrection. For in running this race, we affirm the power of the Gospel to transform lives—not just our own, but the lives of all whom we encounter along the way.

So run; and share the Good News.

May the grace and peace of the Risen Christ be with you today and always.

From every pastor that has served at our church, no matter the term, if you took part in the life of the church you had to glean something. From Pastor John Hogue we first learned of Rev. Dr. Michael Piazza who was serving in Brooklyn, NY at the time. He has been a pastor for a good 50 years, is a nationally-known author, and church growth consultant. He now serves at Arlington Congregational Church in Jacksonville, FL, where he moved a couple of years ago with his partner to help care for his aging parents. Before Pastor John departed, we had asked Rev. Piazza to come and speak at our church. It was in the planning stages when the move to Florida became necessary. I have continued to subscribe to his daily message, "Liberating Word – Equipping progressive people of faith to be champions of peace & justice." In one of his most recent messages he talks about how as mainline churches of the UCC "our differences are our gift," and that we need to publicly express those differences. He cites some of these gifts as follows: ordaining women, being accepting of all God's children, caring about issues of social justice, and taking care of the environment so we leave a planet on which our children can live. He goes on to say, "The overwhelming majority of younger people agree with our values. They don't darken our doors, however, because they assume we are just like all the other churches. Until we decide to celebrate our differences, young people will continue to avoid our churches because they assume we are like the rest." His point being that if we don't share who we are out in the community, how does anyone know?

I am delighted to say that Pastor Walt is working tirelessly to make Rev. Piazza's visit to our Valley a reality! The wheels are already in motion to include our neighboring churches of the Eastern Slope Clergy and the NH Conference. This is only the start of plans on how we can grow our church. Please come and gather with us. We need your voice!



Pastoral Relations Committee

Why have a Pastoral Relations Committee?

This is an excerpt from Guidelines for the Pastoral Relations Committee from the Christian Church of Christ and the Christian Ministry with the addition of tips for active listening.

1. Building up the Body of Christ

The first reason is to build up the life of the church and its ministry. The church is the body of Christ, knit together by God for the mutual up-building of life. This responsibility calls for sensitive care and careful discernment regarding what is beneficial, and is to be exercised in a humble and loving way.

2. Support

The PRC is to provide focused, consistent support for the pastor. Ministry is a high stress profession. The high level of personal and congregational expectations contribute to the need for support. Being the primary *care-giver*, the pastor needs a supportive environment for renewal.

All humans need love and the support of other human beings. Personal growth and effectiveness with which a person functions is largely dependent on the quality, if not the quantity, of support they receive. The PRC is a way in which a congregation is intentional about providing support for its pastor and family. The role of a pastor's spouse/partner is unlike that of other professional people. Therefore, the PRC needs to be sensitive to the experiences of the spouse/partner.

3. Feedback and Communication

The PRC can provide a regular channel of communication for cultivating an open, affirmative and creative relationship between the pastor and congregation, enabling the church to fulfill its mission effectively. Communication is a vital ingredient in the provision of support.

- Listening is a presence and affirmation of another
- Listen with the "third ear", pay close attention to feelings and body language
- Take time for discernment, ask follow-up questions to fully understand what is being shared
- Check your perceptions by repeating to the speaker what was heard
- Forming a response while listening is not truly listening. It's okay to sit, take time to reflect on the speaker's words before speaking
- A verbal response is not always necessary or even being asked of you

Hello everyone,




