

The Pastor's Piece Avoid the Rabbit Holes

There's a place that is very dear to me—a wild, windswept beach in the southwest of Ireland called Barley Cove. Picture vast tidal flats where the North Atlantic rolls in with majestic waves, and the sand scattered with beautiful rocks and shells. Encircling this natural wonder are acres of sand dunes, peppered with hundreds of rabbit holes. But when I remember watching the rabbits scurry to and fro, it's easy to imagine the darkness that lies within those tunnels, a stark contrast to the openness of this grand beach.

This image often comes to mind when I think about the ways we cope with fear. The world seems brimming with situations that can lead us down dark, narrow tunnels of fear: global conflicts, such as the ongoing tensions between Russia and Ukraine and the strife in the Middle East; the sharp divides in our own country brought on by polarized politics and recent alarming events, including the attempted assassination of a presidential candidate; and the perennial concerns like economic instability, racial injustice, and debates over immigration.

In these challenging times, it's easy to find ourselves like those rabbits, darting into dark holes—especially with the constant bombardment of news, the relentless cycle of commentary, and the echo chambers of social media that reinforce our deepest anxieties. This non-stop exposure can send us spiraling down paths of despair and helplessness.

I want to encourage you to step back from the brink of these rabbit holes. Instead of allowing fear to dictate our lives, I want to invite you to consider some actionable steps to remain grounded in hope and positivity.

Limiting Exposure: Start by moderating your consumption of news. Stay informed, but avoid the incessant stream of updates that can lead to anxiety. This includes stepping away from the cycle of doom scrolling on social media and seeking out news sources that are known for their balanced and factual reporting.

Community and Connection: Surround yourself with people who inspire optimism. Engage in conversations that uplift rather than those that pull you into the vortex of pessimism. Our faith community is a good place to find support and perspective, to remind ourselves of the goodness and resilience in people.

Gratitude and Focus on the Good: Make it a daily practice to reflect on what you are grateful for. This can be as simple as acknowledging something beautiful you saw, a kind gesture from a neighbor, or an achievement at work. By focusing on these positives, we build a buffer against the corrosive effects of fear.

Spiritual Wisdom and Assurance: Deepening our connection with our recklessly loving God can significantly buffer us against the angst and uncertainty of our times. The Scriptures offer numerous reassurances of God's unwavering love and protection. Beyond the calming words of Isaiah 43, we also find comfort in Psalm 23, which teaches us, "Even though I walk through the darkest valley, I will fear no evil, for you are with me; your rod and your staff, they comfort me." These passages remind us of the protective and guiding presence of God through all trials. Reflecting on such promises can strengthen our faith and diminish our fears, grounding us in a reality upheld by divine assurance.

When fear looms large, let's remember that we are not alone. God walks with us, offering a light that guides us back to the open, sunlit expanses of hope. By choosing to step away from the rabbit holes of fear and into the embrace of community, gratitude, and faith, we can navigate even the most turbulent waters.

In this journey, our church stands as a beacon of hope, a community where you can find peace and strength. Together, let us pledge to look beyond the immediate shadows and recognize the enduring light that promises renewal and resilience.

As we continue to face the complexities of our world, let us hold fast to these practices. They are our lifeline, pulling us back from the brink of fear and guiding us toward a path marked by peace and presence. Let us walk this path together, supporting one another and strengthening our community as we move forward, always forward, into the light.

On August 24th and 25th White Mountain Musical Arts will present the 33rd Mostly Bach weekend. Great appreciation is extended to The First Church of Christ, Congregational for, not only hosting this major cultural event, but supporting this wonderful musical Festival in the Mount Washington Valley. We are fortunate to have a venue with a fine pipe organ, grand piano, harpsichord and space to accommodate a Baroque orchestra and chorus. That weekend our sanctuary will resound with a full Baroque Orchestra and Chorus. Two totally different programs are Saturday evening at 7:30 p.m. and Sunday afternoon at 4:30 p.m. The musical forces, once again, will be conducted by Dr. Robert Lehmann

from the University of Southern Maine.

Programming for the weekend will include J. S. Bach's well-loved Orchestral Suite No. 3 in D Major, Cantata BWV 110, *Unser Mund sei voll Lachens* (May Our Mouths be Full of Laughter) with Orchestra, Chorus and four outstanding vocal soloists. The solo Cantata BWV 54, Widerstehe doch der Sunde (Just Resist Sin) will be sung by Emily Marvosh, White Mountain Musical Arts favorite alto. Kimberly Lehmann will play G. B. Telemann's Concerti for Viola in G Major, and the Concerto for Flute in G major by G, Pergolesi will be performed by Chase Whelan, our 2024 young artist. Duncan Cumming and Floyd Corson will perform W. A. Mozart's Sonata KV 358 in Bb for Four Hands as a tribute to four deceased members of our Bach family. G. F. Handel's rousing Coronation Anthem No. !, *Zadock the Priest* will open the Sunday afternoon concert.

You see, from my summer pew I can see Pastor Walt's face, the welcomer, liturgist, soloist or guest musicians. Unlike anyone else in the congregation, I can see everyone's face... from the choir loft.

Only from the choir loft can I be immersed in the spectacular inspirations that are the stained-glass windows that welcome me at the rear of the sanctuary, as I take my seat in the choir loft.

Only from the choir loft can I see Mae Shea's seat in the pew halfway back on the left side...the first seat, and wonder if the person sitting there while Mae is in Florida for the winter knows whose seat he or she is in. Only from the choir loft can I see all the different ways our congregation members sing hymns. Some bury their noses in the hymnals and never come up for air. As my glance passes from face to face, I'm reminded that there will be so many more that we will miss.

Only from the choir loft can I see the faces bursting with joy and good news...the ones that can barely stand to wait for Joys and Concerns, but I also see the faces of those who carry a heavy burden or someone whose usual smile is buried under concern or sadness...someone who needs a hug after church.

Only from the choir loft can I get an up-close view of our organist's face. The awe I feel of Floyd being able to tell ten fingers and two feet to perform in different directions and rhythms at the same time is confirmed by the concentration on his face. Passion and devotion are surely the source of this gift he gives us every Sunday.

Only from the choir loft can I see the faces of those sharing Communion...no mater what their position or status in the church, everyone - pastor, deacons, congregants and guests - eat and drink at the same time.

Only from the choir loft can I see Pastor Walt preaching in the pulpit...not just from the chest up, but all of Pastor Walt, and when he delivers a message that nudges us out of our comfortableness, I allow my eyes to leave Pastor Walt and check the reaction of the congregation. Only from the choir loft can I see and determine that Pastor Walt's messages connect God's word to the lives of God's people.






