

The Pastor's Piece

Advent, if one could have a favorite season of the liturgical year, I would have to claim this one for me. That is not to say that the others, like Lent and Easter, are unimportant, but Advent is mine. When Lent and Easter come I would probably say that Lent and Easter are my favorites.

So, I have to ask myself, Why then is Advent so valuable for my own faith journey? Advent is a season of preparation for the birth of Christ and sets the stage for the future reign of Christ. Advent is a preparation for rather than a celebration of Christmas. The music of Advent in many churches is confined to hymns specifically written to carry the message of preparation. While many communities of faith use what is commonly referred to as Christmas Carols, they are not presented during worship until the celebration of Christmas begins. The true celebration of Christmas begins on Christmas Eve and continues for the next twelve days.

The Season of Advent begins on Sunday, December the 3rd and continues for four Sundays. The interesting thing for this calendar year is that the fourth Sunday is also Christmas Eve. There will be worship at 10am and a candlelight Christmas Eve Service at 7pm.

The theme for the season, Advent, and Christmas, will be "The Gift of Being Present." The season, while filled with preparation and anticipation, can also be filled with worry about finding the perfect Christmas gifts. Deep down we want people in our lives to know they are special and that we love them. But sometimes we overlook the greatest gift of all...our very presence. Through scripture we learn that our spiritual ancestors were also worried—often about survival in the midst of political occupation. The scriptural response is "the Holy Living One is with you." Like a shepherd who never leaves the flock, we are held close. This season we are all invited to be the gift of presence for our loved ones, for our communities, and for those who need it most.

Each week of Advent we will unwrap a gift with a focus for the day. These are not unfamiliar gifts as they are traditionally represented in the Advent wreath. The tradition of an Advent wreath began in Germany in 1839, created out of evergreens symbolizing everlasting life in the midst of winter. The wreath, being round, reminds us of God's unending love and the eternal life He makes possible. Four candles are placed within the wreath and a candle is lit each Sunday representing hope, peace, joy, and love. It is not uncommon for families to have an Advent wreath in the home and is an excellent way to remind ourselves of the importance of the season.

My prayer for the season is one penned by Matthew Kelly: "God of hope, I look to you with an open heart and yearning spirit. During this Advent season, I will keep alert and awake, listening for your word and keeping to your precepts. My hope is in you."

This year the event will take place at Market Basket from 9:00AM to 2:00PM. Food collection and money donations will be divided between the Conway Village Church Food Pantry and the Vaughan Food Pantry. Again, another fun event to assist with, and raise awareness about, the serious matter of food insecurity many families experience here in the Mount Washington Valley and beyond.

As we see 2023 in the rearview mirror, let's look forward to 2024 with optimism and opportunity!

LOVE CAME DOWN AT CHRISTMAS SINGING THE STORY OF CHRISTMAS

Christina Rossetti was known for her deeply spiritual writings and was considered one of the Victorian era's greatest and most influential poets along with Alfred Lord Tennyson and Robert Browning. Several of her poems have been set to music, with the most familiar to some of us being "Love Came Down at Christmas" sung to a traditional Irish melody "Garton." These sweet lyrics appear in over 61 hymnals.

Born in London, England, to Italian parents, Christina was the youngest member of a remarkable family of artists, writers and poets who inherited many of her artistic tendencies from her father. Christina received her earliest education from her mother, who had been trained as a governess and was committed to cultivating intellectual excellence in her family. Christina lived with her mother virtually all of her life and never married.

The Christmas hymn"Love Came Down at Christmas" is a sincere, simple, beautiful, heartfelt hymn based on the poem by Christina Rossetti (1830-1894), that focuses on the greatest gift ever given to the world, Jesus Christ. Through its simple words and repetition, we are reminded that at its very core, Christmas is a love story between God and humanity. If you count the word "lovely," "Love" is mentioned 12 times in three short verses of "Love Came Down at Christmas." The hymn is modeled after the scripture it is based on - 1 John 4:7-11.

The first verse lays out the image of the extravagant love of God being showered down upon us at Christmas, heralded by stars and angels.


The second verse moves into our response to this great love - WORSHIP. We gather to worship and praise God for this gift of love in our lives. Worship is not something we do for one hour once a week; worship can be a way of life, always praising God, always listening for God's word, and being called to respond in action.

Verse three is our response to the extravagant love that came down at Christmas. LOVE is the sign that we offer to others to show that Christ has come. When people see us giving of ourselves, sacrificing, extravagantly loving others, that's when they see God, and that's when they see what LOVE looks like.

God's greatest demonstration of love for each of us did, in fact, come down at Christmas in the form of his infant son. Love was born for each of us in a stable, and now it is for each of us to take God's light and love into the world and share it with others. Seasons come and go, but the simple gifts of love we give are the gifts that last a lifetime!

WE ARE THE SIGN THAT POINTS THE WAY TO THE LOVE THAT CAME DOWN AT CHRISTMAS.

May you be blessed with the love and peace that is Christmas!
