

The Pastor's Piece Be A Christmas People

Christmas has come and gone. The gifts unwrapped. The decorations packed away. The tree, if you had one, is heading for the curb or back into storage.

But Christmas isn't over. Not really.

It isn't something we check off a list. It isn't a frantic season we survive. It isn't a memory we set aside. Christmas is a calling. It's who we're meant to be.

We are a Christmas people.

We believe in the incarnation. God taking on flesh. God showing up in this messy, beautiful, broken world. Jesus was the fullest expression of this incarnation.

But Jesus didn't come to corner the market on being God's presence in the world. He came to show us how it's done. He came to remind us that God is always showing up. Always wanting to be born. And that the work of Christmas is never done.

The incarnation is not a one-time event. It's an eternal reality. Richard Rohr reminds us that the Cosmic Christ has been present since the beginning of time. The Christ consciousness—God's love, wisdom, and presence—is woven into the fabric of creation itself.

When we celebrate Christmas, we remember this profound truth. God's presence is not limited to one moment or one person. It's everywhere. In everyone. In all things. And we are invited to awaken to this reality and embody it in our lives.

Howard Thurman said it best: "When the song of the angels is stilled, when the star in the sky is gone, when the kings and princes are home, when the shepherds are back with their flocks, the work of Christmas begins. To find the lost, to heal the broken, to feed the hungry, to release the prisoner, to rebuild the nations, to bring peace among others, to make music in the heart."

That's the work of Christmas. That's our work. The ongoing incarnation. God's love showing up through us.

This isn't abstract theology. It's not about head knowledge. It's about hands and feet. Hearts and voices. Being the ones who bring good news to the poor. Bind up the brokenhearted. Feed the hungry. Lift up the downtrodden.

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It's about letting God be born again and again. In your life. In your choices. In your relationships.

So how do we live this out? How do we stay a Christmas people when the lights fade and the carols stop?

Start with small things. Small kindnesses. A smile for a stranger. A phone call to someone lonely. A meal for a hungry neighbor.

Commit to larger things too. Volunteer your time. Support organizations that heal and lift up. Advocate for justice in your community. Speak up for the marginalized. Show up for those in need.

Stay mindful of your connection to all creation. Christmas reminds us that God is in all things. Every tree, every star, every creature. Even the ones we overlook. Even the ones we fear. Even the ones we don't understand.

The work of Christmas isn't always grand. It's often quiet. Hidden. Simple acts of love. A willingness to show up. A choice to forgive. A moment of grace extended.

This is the ongoing incarnation. God being born through us. Not because we are perfect. But because we are willing.

As we step into the New Year, let's carry Christmas with us. Let's keep birthing light in the darkness. Let's be the ones who refuse to give up on hope. On peace. On joy. On love.

Let's not wait for someone else to do it. Let's not wait for perfect circumstances. God doesn't wait. God shows up right in the middle of the mess. And calls us to do the same.

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We are called to be peacemakers. To sow light. To heal wounds. To mend what is broken. To live the prayer of Saint Francis:

Lord, make me an instrument of your peace. Where there is hatred, let me sow love. Where there is injury, pardon. Where there is doubt, faith. Where there is despair, hope. Where there is darkness, light. Where there is sadness, joy.

This is our work. This is our calling. To embody God's presence. To be Christmas people. Every single day.

So let's do it. Let's carry Christmas into the world. Into our homes. Into our workplaces. Into every interaction.

Let's show up. With our hearts open. With our hands ready. With our voices lifted in hope.

Because the world needs Christmas. The world needs us. And God is always waiting to be born.

Let's not keep Christmas behind us. Let's live it. Let's be it. Every day.

Let's be a Christmas people. And let's begin now.

CHRIST WHOSE GLORY FILLS THE SKIES A SONG FOR EPIPHANY CELEBRATING CHRIST AS THE LIGHT OF THE WORLD

HAPPY NEW YEAR!

Epiphany, celebrated on January 6, marks the end of the Christmas season (commonly referred to as the 12 days of Christmas). It's a time in the liturgical year we remember the Magi's journey and Jesus being revealed as the Savior of the world. The word "Epiphany" actually comes from the Greek meaning "manifestation" or striking appearance." In some churches, Epiphany is considered the start of a new season that runs through the Tuesday before Ash Wednesday and the beginning of Lent. In other churches, Epiphany is celebrated as a single day. Regardless of how you celebrate, Epiphany Sunday and the weeks that follow are about light, revelation, and glory; God manifested in the flesh, came to dwell among us. We remember all of the people who first experienced this revelation of good news: the shepherds in the fields, Mary and Joseph, and the wise men from the East.

As Matthew tells us, it wasn't simply a star in the sky that drew the Magi to Bethlehem. They recognized that the star itself was a sign, a message of something bigger. It was the light of Christ himself, revealed to the entire world, that pulled those Magi over mountains and deserts and seas to the countryside surrounding Jerusalem.

Before they even knew who he would become or what it meant for their lives, this epiphany, manifestation, appearance, changed their lives.

The hymn "Christ Whose Glory Fills the Skies" originally titled "Morning Hymn" was written by Charles Wesley, (1707-1788), who was the author of more than 6000 hymns during his lifetime. "Christ Whose Glory Fills the Skies" is considered one of Wesley's best and greatest hymns. Charles Wesley was born in Epsworth, England, the son of an Anglican priest and poet. He was educated at Oxford University where his brothers also studied. Charles married Sarah Gwynne in 1749, and together they had eight children.

The first stanza of "Christ Whose Glory Fills the Skies" reveals Christ, the true and only light that gives light to everyone was coming into the world. The second stanza describes what the day would be like without Christ's presence - cheerless and dark! The third stanza is our prayer for Christ to come and fill us with His radiance. RATISBON, is the tune that most often accompanies the hymn.

"Christ Whose Glory Fills the Skies" is a glorious hymn to Christ, the Sun of Righteousness, the Light of the World!

Creating Safe and Welcoming Space for All

We cherish our mission to be a place of refuge, community, and spiritual growth. As part of our commitment to ensuring a safe and welcoming environment, the Board of Trustees recently adopted two important policies that followed from our fall seminar Emergency Preparedness seminar presented by the New Hampshire Department of Homeland Security.

Firearms Policy

To maintain a peaceful environment, firearms are not permitted on church property, except for active law enforcement officers. This policy reflects our desire to create a space where everyone feels secure, free from the anxiety or concerns associated with weapons.

Backpack Policy

Similarly, backpacks and large bags are no longer allowed in our worship spaces and gathering areas. While exceptions exist for small personal items and bags required for specific purposes, this measure enhances safety during services and events.

We believe these steps align with our calling to foster a space where worship, fellowship, and ministry can flourish without distraction or fear.

Signage will be installed at entrances to ensure everyone is aware of these policies, and we are grateful for your understanding and cooperation as we implement these changes.

Let us continue to be a community rooted in love, hospitality, and care for one another. If you have questions or concerns about these policies, feel free to reach out to me.


