

# The Pastor's Piece Make Room! By Pastor Walt Hampton, J.D., CFC

Summertime. And the living is easy. Or so the song goes. But often, our summertime is anything but. Between cookouts, community gatherings, and the seemingly endless whirl of activities, even our vacations can leave us more exhausted than rejuvenated—needing a vacation from our vacation. Amidst this joyful chaos, it can be easy to overlook the divine presence that pulses beneath our packed schedules—the all-loving God who makes all these blessings possible.

As we enter these long, warm days filled with sunlight stretching well into the evening, I want to invite you to consider a simple, profound practice: making room for God. This isn't about carving out vast swathes of your day or altering your summer plans drastically. Instead, it's about threading moments of prayer and connection with the Divine into the fabric of your everyday life.

"A Course in Miracles" reminds us that when we make room for God, we are filled with such power that nothing can disturb our peace. Imagine that—peace that flows through you as you move from activity to activity, a tranquility that grounds you no matter how hectic your schedule gets.

The apostle Paul offers a joyful formula for this in 1 Thessalonians 5:16-18: "Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you." These words are not just a call to prayer but to a continuous celebration of life, acknowledging and appreciating God's hand in the mundane and the magnificent.

And as we make room for God, we realize the truth of Acts 17:28: "For in him we live and move and have our being." This is not about creating a separate space for spirituality but recognizing that our entire existence is enveloped in the divine. Every breath, step, and heartbeat is an opportunity to connect with God, who is as near as our next breath

How can we practice this? Start small. Perhaps as you sip your morning coffee, offer a brief prayer of gratitude for the new day. Or as you watch the sunset, pause for a moment to feel God's presence in the beauty of the skies. Maybe during those busy moments, take a quick second to acknowledge His presence quietly.

Consider also creating brief daily or weekly rituals that anchor you in God's presence. This could be a short morning meditation, reading a daily devotional, or writing down three things you are grateful for each night before bed. These practices can become beacons of peace, guiding you back to your spiritual center.

Involve your family and friends in these moments. Share a prayer before meals, even if it's a picnic in the park or a quick bite between summer outings. Let these small acts of faith be the threads that weave a richer, fuller tapestry of communal and personal spirituality.

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

This summer, let every invitation, every event, every moment of rest be an opportunity to connect more deeply with God. Let this be a summer not just of doing, but of being—in profound communion with the Divine.

So, as you plan your summer, make room for God. It doesn't require grand gestures, but rather, the quiet determination to recognize and cherish God's presence in all things. In doing so, you may find that your summer transforms into something extraordinary—a season of genuine peace, joy, and spiritual fulfillment.

#### IN THE LOFT WITH ELAINE PAUL

I recently asked Elaine Paul, soprano, faithful member of the Chancel Choir and valued member of the Music Team of First Church of Christ, Congregational, to respond to a few questions about her involvement with music for the July issue of the Congregate Tidings. Please enjoy Elaine's responses which are thoughtful and sincere.

MM: How long have you been singing, and what is your most memorable experience of singing in the choir at First Church of Christ, Congregational or in any other choir or chorus? EP: I started singing in my church choir when I was in junior high school. My beloved Episcopal church was a huge part of my childhood and growing up years. Early on I took piano lessons from a church member then progressed to organ lessons, also taught by a church member. My walk home from school took me right past my



church, where I stopped to practice the organ every day after school because we didn't have an organ at home. My beloved minister was always there in his office to greet me and be sure I got a snack before I started practicing. Singing in the choir was just the logical next step. I learned early on that I liked to sing better than I liked playing the piano and organ (the organ was much too difficult for me anyway), so by high school I was taking private voice lessons and singing in the high school acapella choir instead. I am hopeful that some of the youngsters who hear us sing and play every Sunday will find their way to music the same way. Sadly, my life after childhood took me on a very different path and away from singing for many years, and it is only in the last decade or so that I have been singing with groups again and loving it so much. My fondest past and ongoing memory of First Church choir is listening to Dick Altenbern sing the Lord's Prayer! He brings his voice, his faith, and his passion to it in a way that makes me both smile and cry every time. Thanks Dick!

MM: How does singing relate to your spiritual life?

EP: Singing relates to my spiritual life in every way. The spiritual music that we sing every week is a form of prayer that nurtures my soul and my spirit beyond measure. When I am not singing, I am listening to music whenever I am by myself in the car or at home. The only time I do not listen to music at home is when the sounds of the birds, bees, and other outside wildlife fill my home with their music.

**MM:** Could you name some favorite anthems and hymns?

EP: There are so many favorites but my absolute favorite hymn, which was also my mother's favorite hymn, is "In The Garden." In one of Pastor Walt's recent messages, he spoke about the importance of taking time to talk with God, and not just in the sanctuary. I talk with God in my garden every day, and it nurtures my soul.

MM: What kind of music do you enjoy?

EP: I like most kinds of music: some classical and opera, some popular, and country music too because it always tells a story. Not a fan of jazz for some reason.

MM: What might we be surprised to learn about you?

EP: One thing that may surprise you to know about me is that I am the mother of an Olympic swimmer. My son, Scott, was very hyperactive as a two-year-old, and a wise and wonderful pediatrician suggested swimming lessons. Once in the pool, he hardly ever got out. He bronzed in the 200-meter men's relay in Barcelona in 1992. Competitive swimming was a great way to grow up, and watching the sun come up on many a morning while driving him to practice or a swim meet is a treasured memory.


