

The Pastor's Piece By Pastor Sue Davidson

Is it summer or is it fall? It is always a mystery to me this time of year. The temperature and humidity tell me that it is summer. Yet there are those days that 'fall is in the air'. What I have noticed is the mountains and how they have changed over the last month. There were many days that a haze existed either from the humid air or the drifting effects of fires north or west of the Mt. Washington Valley. One of my favorite views of the mountains is the clouds that hang low and then the sun hits the peaks. Even snow on Mt Washington is beautiful!

As I considered worship for October, that is the last three Sundays of the month, I was drawn to a passage of scripture in the Gospel of Matthew. Jesus had been on the mountain with a few disciples and he was transfigured before their very eyes. Upon coming down from the mountain, the disciples attempted a healing without success. The disciples asked Jesus, "Why couldn't we drive the demon out of the boy"? Jesus replied, "Because you have so little faith. Truly I tell you, if you have faith as small as a mustard seed, you can say to this mountain, 'Move from here to there,' and it will move. Nothing will be impossible for you."

Move mountains, do we really believe this or do we just hear and say, "Not possible." As you may have learned in these past months, I like to develop worship in a series. Most importantly, I want to make sure that if a week is missed, those in worship on any given Sunday morning do not feel left behind.

There are five Sundays in the month of October. I will be away the first two, which will be led by the laity using a vast number of resources to plan worship that will be inspiring and spirit filled. The remaining Sundays I will be planning worship around the theme of 'Move Mountains'.

- God is on the Move
- Mountains Can Seem Like Obstacles
- Mountains as Opportunity and We Can Move the Mountain

While the thought of moving mountains seems impossible, a reminder to us all is that nothing is impossible with God.

Each morning I listen to 'Pray As You Go', https://pray-as-you-go.org/. It is a daily prayer session, designed to go with you wherever you go, to help you pray whenever you find time, but particularly whilst traveling to and from work, study, etc. It is not a 'Thought for the Day," a sermon, or a bible-study, but rather a framework for your own prayer. Lasting between ten and thirteen minutes, it combines music, scripture and questions for reflection. I find the music especially calming and insightful. The one that struck me this week is simply titled, "The Lord Will Provide." These are the words:

In some way or another, the Lord will provide
It may not be my way
It may not be your way, but He will
At some time or another, the Lord will provide
It may not be my time
It may not be your time; we will
Trust in the Lord, and the Lord will provide
Yes we'll trust in the Lord, and the Lord will provide
Trust in the Lord, and the Lord will provide
Yes we'll trust in the Lord, and the Lord will provide

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May our worship reveal the path to moving mountains not only for us as a community of faith but in our own lives as we learn about harnessing the power of faith in God.



Two-thirds of the offering is used by the UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries to fund a wide array of local and national justice initiatives, advocacy efforts, and direct service projects. Through our national Justice and Local Church Ministries office, https://tinyurl.com/2bfytatb, you can find resources, news updates, and action alerts on a broad spectrum of justice issues. Working with members of the UCC Justice and Peace Action Network (a network of thousands of UCC justice and peace

advocates), Justice and Witness continues its strong policy advocacy work on issues such as the federal budget, voting rights, immigration, health care, hate crimes, civil liberties, and environmental justice. Neighbors in Need also supports our American Indian neighbors in the UCC. One-third of the offering supports the UCC's Council for American Indian Ministries (CAIM). Historically, forebears of the UCC established churches and worked with Lakota, Dakota, Nakota, Mandan, Hidatsa, Arickara, and Hocak in North and South Dakota, Wisconsin, and northern Nebraska. Today there are 20 UCC congregations on reservations and one urban, multi-tribal UCC congregation in Minneapolis, Minnesota. These churches and their pastors are supported by CAIM. CAIM is also an invaluable resource for more than 1,000 individuals from dozens of other tribes and nations who are members of other UCC congregations in the U.S.

I COME WITH JOY

A HYMN CELEBRATING WORLD COMMUNION SUNDAY By Muriel Magg - Music Team Chair

Every year on the first Sunday in October, (October 1 this year) Christians around the globe celebrate WORLD COMMUNION SUNDAY. On that day, Christians in every culture break bread and pour the cup to remember and affirm Christ as the Head of the Church and remember that they are part of the whole body of believers. Whether shared in a grand cathedral, a mud hut, outside on a hilltop, in a storefront, or meetinghouse, Christians celebrate the communion liturgy in as many ways as there are congregations. World Communion Sunday can be both a profound worship experience and a time for celebrating our oneness in Christ with all our brothers and sisters around the world that gather as a family at the table.

Brian Wren, (b. 1936) was born and raised in Romford, Essex, England. His B.A. and PhD. degrees are from Oxford University. He was ordained in 1965 and was pastor of the Congregational Church (now United Reformed) in Great Britain, but now is a citizen of the United States, where he is active as a lecturer, pastor and full-time hymn writer. Brain is married to Susan Heafield, a United Methodist minister, who sometimes collaborates with him in composing congregational songs. Brian Wren is widely recognized as one of the top hymn writers in the world. Fourteen of Brian's hymns are in the United Methodist hymnal, and countless others are sung by congregations of all denominations. Brian worked for many organizations involved in fighting poverty and promoting peace and justice.

Brian Wren, wrote this month's featured hymn titled, "I Come with Joy" (# 349 in our New Century Hymnal). Much of Brian's subject matter comes from worship in regular churches like ours. "I Come with Joy" was written for Brian's home congregation as a summation of a sermon series his wife preached on communion.

The hymn gives us new ways of seeing things because joy isn't the emotion, we first associate with the sacrament. The mood of communion is usually more solemn than joyful. Brian Wren's song reminds us that communion is this little breakthrough of God's kingdom on earth. Everyone has enough. No one is excluded. No one is considered a better person than another. It is about sharing. Looking out after one another. What could be more joyful than this practice in a world where exclusion, judgmentalism and division are the order of the day?

The first stanza of "I Come with Joy" reminds us that we can come to the table with joy because it is a reminder that we are forgiven, loved and free.

The second stanza places the worshiper with "Christians far and near."

By the third stanza we are being shaped as one in Christ's love and strangers now are friends. The fourth stanza describes Christ's presence within the faith community as well as in the communion meal.

The final stanza functions as a sung benediction. "Together met, together bound, we'll go our different ways."

Through the singing of this hymn, we are molded into the body of Christ in worship and return to the world as Christ's "people in the world."

"I Come with Joy" is sung to the tune DOVE OF PEACE, a Southern Harmony composed by William Walker in 1835.

So, we celebrate communion. The great thanksgiving. The great reminder that there is much to be joyful for. We are in the hands of a loving God who has placed all we need within us to be joyful. LET US COME WITH JOY!






