

The Pastor's Piece Attention! Attention! By Pastor Walt Hampton, J.D., CFC

As we move into September, a month often associated with fresh starts and new beginnings, it's a fitting time to reflect on where we direct our attention. Philosopher and mystic Simone Weil once observed, "Our attention is our fate." She also said, "Absolutely unmixed attention is prayer." These words carry a profound truth: the way we focus our attention shapes our lives.

Annie Dillard echoed a similar sentiment when she wrote, "How we spend our days is how we spend our lives." These insights remind us that our attention is not just a passive act; it's an active investment, a currency we "pay" every moment of every day.

In our modern world, there is an unrelenting demand for our attention. Everywhere we turn, something or someone is vying for it. Notifications, emails, social media, advertisements, and even the endless stream of news updates all compete for our mental space. The result? We often feel scattered, distracted, and overwhelmed. Our ability to focus and maintain sustained attention becomes weakened, like a muscle that hasn't

been exercised properly. This constant fragmentation can leave us feeling fatigued and stressed, and it ultimately pulls us away from what truly matters.

But September offers us a unique opportunity to hit the reset button. As summer winds down and the rhythm of life begins to shift with the start of a new season, we can take a moment to reassess how we're spending our days—and by extension, how we're spending our lives. This month can be a time to become more mindful of where we direct our attention, to strengthen the muscles of focus and intention.

Imagine attention as a form of currency. Every time we give our attention to something, we are making a payment. The question we need to ask ourselves is: What are we buying with our attention? Are we investing it in things that nourish our souls, deepen our relationships, and bring us closer to God? Or are we spending it on distractions that drain our energy and leave us feeling empty?

One way to become more mindful of our attention is to create intentional pauses throughout the day. These pauses can be as simple as taking a few deep breaths, stepping away from a screen, or spending a moment in silence. During these moments, ask yourself: Where has my attention been? Is it where I want it to be? These small check-ins can help you redirect your focus toward what truly matters.

Another practice that can help is setting clear boundaries for your attention. In the same way that you wouldn't give your money away without considering its value, you shouldn't give your attention away without discernment. This might mean turning off notifications during certain hours, setting aside specific times for prayer or meditation, or even unplugging from digital devices altogether for a portion of the day. By protecting your attention, you create space for deeper connection with yourself, with others, and with the Divine.

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It's also important to remember that where we place our attention is a reflection of our values. If we say that relationships are important to us, but we're constantly distracted when spending time with loved ones, we're not truly honoring those relationships. If we value spiritual growth, but our attention is scattered across countless distractions, we may struggle to deepen our connection with God. By aligning our attention with our values, we bring more integrity and purpose into our lives.

As we embrace the new beginnings that September offers, let's commit to becoming more mindful of our attention. Let's practice paying attention to what really matters, investing our mental and emotional energy in ways that bring us closer to our true selves and to God. The demands on our attention aren't going away, but we can choose how we respond to them. We can choose to focus on what enriches our lives, strengthens our relationships, and nurtures our spiritual growth.

In this season of new beginnings, may we find the courage to reclaim our attention, to spend it wisely, and to live with greater intention and purpose. Let this September be a time of renewal—not just of our schedules and routines, but of our very lives, shaped by the sacred act of paying attention.

MAKE ME A CHANNEL OF YOUR PEACE

Sometimes it feels like it was just yesterday; sometimes it feels like it was forever ago. It doesn't matter who you are. It doesn't make a difference where you were. It doesn't matter what you were doing. If you were alive on September 11, 2001, you remember this day that changed America forever.

What happened to our country twenty-three years ago was a horrific tragedy, and it should never be forgotten. I can remember exactly where I was twenty-three years ago. It seems like we all can. Sometimes we need to just sit and remember. Sit and pray for the innocent victims whose lives were tragically shortened, their families, friends, and loved ones and to pay homage to the heroes who responded.

"Make Me a Channel of Your Peace," by Sebastian Temple (1928-1997) is a musical setting of the well-known Prayer of Saint Francis. The prayer is widely attributed to Saint Francis of Assisi, but these words never appear in any of his writings.

The first appearance of the prayer occurred in France in 1912 in a small spiritual magazine called La Clochette (The Little Bell), published in Paris by "The Holy Mass League," an association founded by a French priest, Father Esther Bouquerel. The prayer entitled "A Beautiful Prayer to Say During the Mass" was published anonymously. The author could possibly have been Father Bouquerel himself, but the identity of the author remains a mystery.

The prayer itself was sent in French to Pope Benedict XV in 1915. This was soon followed by its appearance, in Italian, in the daily newspaper of Vatican City. Around 1920 the prayer was printed by a French Franciscan priest on the back of an image of St. Francis with the title "Priere pour la paix" ("Prayer for Peace"), but without being attributed to the saint.

Between the two world wars, the prayer was circulated in Europe and was translated into English. The text of this well-known prayer is about transformation - the movement away from darkness to light, from despair to hope. The words of this prayer also have similarities to the writings of the prophet Isaiah in Chapter 61. During the Second World War and immediately after, this prayer for peace began circulating widely, and over the years, because of its broadly inclusive language, gained worldwide popularity with people of all faiths.

Sebastian Temple is considered one of the most influential folk mass composers. He was born in South Africa and later moved to London, where he worked for the BBC News Service. In 1958, he moved to America, converted to Catholicism, and joined the Franciscan Third Order.


"Make Me a Channel of Your Peace" written in 1967, has become one of Temple's most loved compositions. This hymn was used in the funeral service of Princess Diana and as part of the wedding ceremony of Prince Albert II of Monaco. This hymn was also sung numerous times at memorials following the September 11th, tragedy.

"Make Me a Channel of Your Peace" was composed in the ballad and guitar style typical of 1960's folk music, but accompaniment on piano or organ is also popular. It can be sung by a solo voice, a full choir, or by a congregation. The hymn centers on world peace or service to others and makes it appropriate for both contemporary and traditional worship. The familiarity of the text and the folk-like feel of the melody make it a great and long-lasting contribution to the hymnody of the church.

Twenty-three years ago on September 11th, America was forever changed. That tragic day served as a true test of the American spirit and will forever be remembered. It is a stark reminder of the fragility of human existence and the importance of faith, hope, and unity. Let us be reminded we must never lose that strength of unity and all that it represents by renewing our faith in one another. May the memory of 9/11 continue to unify and strengthen us.



Make me a channel of your peace, Where there is hatred, let me bring your love, Where there is injury, your pardon, Lord, And where there's doubt, true faith in you.

Make me a channel of your peace, Where there's despair in life, let me bring hope, Where there is darkness, only light, And where there's sadness, ever joy.

O Master, grant that I may never seek, So much to be consoled as to console, To be understood as to understand, To be loved as to love with all my soul.

Make me a channel of your peace, It is in pardoning that we are pardoned, In giving of ourselves that we receive. And in dying that we're born to eternal life.
