Pastor's Piece

As I sit and write this newsletter First Church of Christ, Congregational has celebrated Children's Sunday; a day filled with music, stories, food, and games. As I was preparing to present Bibles to the children on behalf of this community of faith, I was taken by the stories in the Bible they knew.

I want to say right up front that I love the Bible. This love began as a child when my reading time was often spent reading our story Bible. It is also important that the Bible storybook wasn't the only reading I did as I read the popular books for young people at the time, like Nancy Drew and the Hardy Boys. However, the Bible stories are the ones that I remember even to this day.

The difference between the Bible stories of my youth and the Bible stories that I read today is that they are seen with a different lens. The apostle Paul in 1 Corinthians 13:11 writes:

"When I was a child, I spoke like a child, I thought like a child, I reasoned as a child. When I became an adult, I put an end to childish ways." (Common English Bible)

I have learned that seeing the Bible stories as a child and as an adult are both important in the development of faith. So what?? The way I look at Bible stories is through a grown-up lens based on my own learning experiences.

During three Sundays in July, (the 16th, 23rd, and 30th) the emphasis for worship will be "Reading Scriptures with New Eyes-Bible Stories for Grown-ups". Three stories, two from the Old Testament

and one from the Gospels, will be explored by approaching them with curiosity and seriousness. By exploring the context of these stories, we can learn that we shouldn't just be interested in the past, but in what the past might say to our present and future.

This then brings me to another question: What's next? My hope is that by taking time in a worship setting that the community of faith will be able to creatively reimagine how these stories will make it possible for us to be persons of faith in the world in which we find ourselves. The Bible might be a library of stories, poems, and letters from more than two millennia ago, but it also continues to resonate and offer insight into how we might engage the world in beautiful ways.

It is my prayer that by engaging these Bible stories we can get a glimpse of the radical, subversive, and transformative nature of these stories. Are you up for this journey of discovery??

"O GOD OF EVERY NATION"

A Hymn of Peace By Muriel Magg – Music Team Chair

Celebrating the Fourth of July is one of the best parts about summer. You get to barbecue with your family, watch fireworks, go to a parade and take part in all the fun summer activities.

But another reason why July 4th is so special is because it's Independence Day, a holiday celebrating the anniversary of the United States officially becoming a country and the values that the country was founded upon.

William W. Reid, Jr. was born in Beechhurst, Long Island, New York on November 12, 1923. The son of a hymnodist, (a composer of hymns or a person who studies hymnody). Reid graduated from Oberlin College and Seminary in Ohio and Yale Divinity School in New Haven, Connecticut. He served as a medic in World War II and spent eight months as a prisoner of war in Germany. Upon his return to America, Reid married the love of his life, Margaret, and together had three children. Bill pastored Congregational and United Methodist churches in Pennsylvania for 56 years. In addition to his work in local parishes, Reid held membership on various commissions and boards, including the Executive Committee of the Hymn Society in the United States and Canada. Bill was an accomplished hymn writer, his hymns, most notably "O God of Every Nation," have been published in hymnals of many denominations. Reid's life was marked by his work for social justice and his tireless work on behalf of the imprisoned and impoverished.

In 1958 he submitted the hymn text of "O God of Every Nation" to a contest sponsored by the Hymn Society of America in conjunction with the Department of International Affairs of the National Council of Churches. The text won first place. The hymn tune "LLANGLOFFAN" is a Welsh hymn harmonized by David Evans. "O God of Every Nation" can also be sung to the tune of: THE PASSION CHORALE, "O Sacred Head, Now Wounded," AURELIA, "The Church's One Foundation,"VIGIL, "Rejoice, Rejoice Believers," LANCASHIRE, "Lead On, O King Eternal," and FINLANDIA, "Be Still, My Soul."

Reid's understanding of the nature of war, combined with personal experiences, parish knowledge, theological understanding, and poetic skill provided the background for this hymn.

The first stanza petitions God to "redeem your whole creation" and "heal our strife-torn world."

The second stanza identifies some of the causes of strife: the "search for wealth and power," "the scorn of truth and right." It concludes with a petition to "deliver every nation, eternal God, we pray."

The third stanza is a plea for strength for "all who labor" that they "may find release...from escalating conflict" so that we might have "hope and courage" and a "faith that none can alter."

The final stanza pleads for a "bright vision" of the cessation of "war, hatred and division" where Christ will reign in "truth and justice" and is reminiscent of comfort found in the book of Revelation.

William W. Reid died on March 27, 2007 and is buried in South Eaton Cemetery, Eaton, Pennsylvania.

As we approach the celebration of our country's independence, let's take time to remember the courage courage our founding fathers displayed, embrace the values our country was built on, appreciate the wonderful gift of freedom that we all enjoy on a daily basis, and honor the men and women dedicated to preserving it.


